

What Is an EHS Audit?

And How To Use One To Determine Your Organization's Health and Safety Standing

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Introduction

An EHS audit is an assessment of an organization's health and safety policies, processes and systems to ensure that they are meeting regulatory standards.

EHS departments are established to ensure that an organization behaves in a safe and environmentally responsible manner. The EHS department prepares the workplace and staff for EHS audits, ensuring that the management system performs at a high standard.

Before a team prepares for an audit, the EHS department must understand the scope and focus area of the audit. Once this is established, your EHS department should begin to compile relevant documents, checklists and previous reports in order to assist with the assessment.

Audits can be carried out either externally or internally. An audit can be conducted by a properly accredited in-house health and safety team member, or it can be carried out by an outside party, such as an independent consultant.

An audit surveys the workplace to determine:

What regulations apply to that specific facility

Whether employees are adhering to health and safety standards

The quality and impact of safety training

The processes, systems and technologies in place to push compliance



Why Are EHS <u>Audits Important? </u>

While it's essential to establish a health and safety program at your workplace, the work doesn't stop there. Health and safety professionals need to be constantly reviewing their programs to ensure its performance aligns with the shifting priorities of the organization and its legal obligations.

An EHS audit can be either voluntary or required. A voluntary audit can be used to evaluate how well the health and safety program is working within an organization and to implement improvements. Mandatory audits can be requested as part of a settlement between an organization and a government agency. In both scenarios, the objectives are the same – to ensure the health, safety and well-being of all employees and to ensure the organization is meeting requirements where applicable.

Audits sometimes reveal prior undetected problems, which can massively improve workplace safety and reduce liability. They can also present areas for improvement that result in the whole facility being run in a more efficient and cost-effective way. Likewise, they can benefit reputation, boost employee morale and reduce the risk of accidents and injury.




